

### **Bishop Vincent Long** and his talk at Mulgoa

One Saturday in June, Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv, Bishop of Parramatta, addressed about eighty people at Mulgoa. Bishop Vincent had responded to an invitation from Dennis and Elizabeth Farrar, the PFGM Diocesan Coordinators of Parramatta Diocese and the NSW Family Groups shared the organisation for the day. The title of his talk was "Towards a Post Clericalist Church".

Over the course of his talk Bishop Vincent spoke of the current crisis in the Church with the handing down of the Royal Commission's report into Institutional Sexual Abuse. He called upon the leadership of the Church at all levels to not only admit the need for change but to discern with the faithful as to what the process and the agenda for change should look like going forward.

Despite this, Bishop Vincent is not without hope. For he believes that the church must seize the Royal Commission's report as a catalyst for change. He went on to say that we must have the courage to bring about a church that is worthy of Christ and his gospel and gave some pointers towards achieving this.

Bishop Vincent stated that we must make structural and systemic reforms to enable the church to move forward. He noted that the exercise of power should be intended for service and gave the example that Jesus gave us at the Last Supper.

It was suggested that we reclaim the priesthood of the baptised, thus making the church more the church of all the baptised. He suggested that the old clericalist model of church was inadequate and recalled that a variety of ministries existed in the early church but over the centuries, these became concentrated in the ordained at the expense of the baptised.

He went on to say that there is need for more listening and a listening church and noted that the Pope talks of a church that is compassionate, open, listening: a synodal church. In quoting Cardinal Martini SJ, Bishop Long said that we must learn to "quarrel peacefully" in a spirit of open and honest dialogue.

The church needs to be open to partnership. Bishop Vincent gave the Gospel example when Jesus sent out the disciples in pairs and spoke of the different gifts that are brought, especially those of women and those of other cultures when we work together.

In concluding, Bishop Vincent said that we have a duty to transform the culture of the Church. He noted that the "anointed of God" as called by the Pope in a letter to the Chilean bishops were exhorted to engage with the people.

We must rise to Christlike way of humility, inclusivity, compassion and powerlessness.

As Grace Cottage closes this weekend, Barbara, our faithful companion and dear friend, concludes this special time of over 40 years' commitment to our Passionist Mission and Charism.

In the early 1970's Barbara and husband Bob went looking for a parish that provided meaning and mission, they heard of St. Anthony's in the Fields, Terrey Hills. Fr Peter McGrath said 'Hello''. Then immediately put them in the Ingham Family Group, the very first Family Group in the parish. From there they moved out to nurture a new Family Group and they were off!!!

As Peter's secretary, and as the PFGM went national and international, Barbara has been a powerhouse of organisation, administration, communication, and formation. She has organised conferences, formation programs, information nights, days and weekends, the Meroo Assemblies, concerts, fundraising functions, social get togethers.

She and others have meet with Bishops, Parish Priests, Pastoral Councils, and she has spoken and preached at weekend masses in numerous dioceses.

And miraculously she managed Fr Peter. Well, most of the time!!

For the past 16 years, Barbara has been coordinating the office at Grace Cottage and its PFGM work. She has also organised the many local functions, education and meditation nights there.
