We share the concern for our poor Victorians, PFGM or not. It is a hard time for you there. In our various communities we are praying every day for the management and containment of the Corona Virus.


I hope, Dennis, you are getting around with a sprightly gait and no pain.'\*

The Wagga Catholic Diocese is mourning the loss of Fr Wilf Plunkett, OAM, who died on Sunday, 7th June aged 92 years.

For more than 50 years, he served the people as a priest across the Riverina area, including more than 30 years at the Sacred Heart Parish Kooringal in Wagga before he retired in 2007.

Fr Plunkett became aware of the Passionist Family Group Movement in 1984 and sent parishioners, Margaret and Paul Casey and others to Terry Hills to gather details. Their glowing reports encouraged Fr Plunkett to invite Fr Peter McGrath, Mary Ingham and their team to visit Kooringal to initiate Family Groups.

In his inimitable style, Fr Peter convinced many people of the importance of Family Groups. He would point out people who had attended the Mass and tell them they were going to be leaders! What an impact he had:

eight Groups were formed consisting of 14-16 families in each and, when Family Groups were officially commenced in 1985, over 600 people from the parish were involved. This was the first Family Group set-up outside of the Sydney area. Fr Wilf encouraged and supported the movement until his retirement. He would travel to say Mass for Groups on their weekends away and was a popular member of many groups. This dedication to the movement so impressed Fr Peter McGrath that he made Fr Wilf a patron of Family Groups.

'Plunk', as Fr Plunkett was lovingly nicked-named, became a member of the McAuliffe Group after he retired to Settlers Retirement Village. He attended most of the group's monthly gatherings and invited the members to important celebrations such as his 80<sup>th</sup> birthday and the 60<sup>th</sup> Jubilee of his ordination.

Fr Plunkett's welcoming nature made him an ideal priest. He mixed with, and was greatly respected by, all residents of the city of Wagga, at Settlers Village and the Diocese as a whole, no matter what a person's circumstance. Pope Francis says he wants his clergy, not just to be shepherds, but to smell like their sheep and that sums up Father Plunkett exactly: he was one of us, a very special person in the lives of the people of Wagga.

Fr Wilf's funeral was held at Sacred Heart Church, Kooringal on Friday 19th June, 2020 under Covid-19 restrictions, limiting the number of mourners in the church to fifty. However, afterwards, Fr Wilf's funeral procession was led by a piper; the bells of the Wagga Cathedral rang out and the city's Mayor paid homage dressed in his robes. Over a thousand students formed a guard of honour along Plunkett Drive, so named for their schools' founder.

The Southern Family Group Team has used Zoom to meet as a team and also to meet with their Parish Cluster coordinators.


This screen shot was taken recently during the Zoom meeting of Knox/Waverley Cluster Parish FG Coordinators.


### "See with the eyes of the heart"

# **BRIAN'S BLOG**



## "Belonging is more important than Getting Together" (Brian Traynor CP)

In the 'early days' of a new Passionist Family Group, regular (monthly) get togethers help the group members to get to know one another and to bond as a family. It is a disappointment when an established group considers these 'get togethers' as being more important than the 'belonging' to one another. The disappointment comes from the likelihood that in PFG's like this, the sense of belonging will be low and the relationships will have remained 'polite' or shallow.

If we didn't know this truth before, COVID-19 has highlighted it, especially in Victoria, where we will remain in lockdown for some time yet. If any Family Groups relied just on 'getting together' to remain close and concerned for one another, then some of the members of those groups will have already begun to forget about each other. Others will not have made any contact, waiting for different times.

But we have to live in our own times. We hear every day about the effects of isolation for older people living alone, or those in nursing homes or hospital who can have no visitors. There are so many families affected by unemployment, the loss of their business or the stress of home schooling. These realities are affecting the families in our Family Groups now!

I've heard people ask, "What can you do?" We know many groups have organised Zoom gatherings which is terrific, even if some members lack the technological knowhow to participate. Hopefully that does not mean – 'No zoom – No contact'. We have phones that enable us to speak or text. We are able to write and deliver or post notes.

Instead of the question, 'What can I do?' being accompanied by a shrug of our shoulders, we can encourage a creative response. Children could help the creativity! This kind of response only happens if we are committed to belonging – and to belong, we need to stay connected with each other.

"Self-absorption in all its forms kills compassion. When we focus on ourselves, our world contracts as our problems and preoccupations loom large. But when we focus on others, our world expands. Our own problems drift to the periphery of the mind and so seem smaller, and we increase our capacity for connection – or compassionate action." (Daniel Goleman)
