Celebrating our 50 Years Anniversary in 2023

Victoria: St Paul Apostle Parish, Endeavour Hills



In mid-August, the members of the four Passionist Family Groups celebrated the PFGM's 50th anniversary. Each of the Groups was allocated to one of the Parish's four weekend Masses and their members actively participated in various roles before enjoying a cuppa and light snacks afterwards. Coordinator, Val Rodrigues said, "We were unable to get too many good



photos of the crowd as it seems everyone was way too invested in the moment." Val also said that there was considerable interest shown and that they hope to start up a new Family Group soon.

NSW: Jesus the Good Shepherd, East Lake Macquarie Parish

On May 7th, this year we celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the PFGM and 32 years of Family Groups at our Parish. We started with eight groups at St Francis Xavier, Belmont in February 1991. We had 12-15 families and well over 150 children participated. It was wonderful, there was much excitement among parishioners as so many people got to know one another.

Our groups had planning meetings at the beginning of each year to decide on functions and activities. At least once a year, all the groups came together for a function or activity. In our first year, it was an 'It's a Knockout (Parish) Picnic,' where all the groups joined in the fun of playing games against each other. We had 9 groups, one for each family group and a 9th group for any parishioners who had not joined a group. Each group had a colour and everyone in that group wore a shirt in their colour. So, ball games such as tunnel ball, overhead ball, egg and spoon races, three legged races, tug-of-wars and lots of others. It was great.

All the groups looked forward to having their weekend away once and sometimes twice a year and we enjoyed many different venues.

Our Progressive Dinners were very popular and lasted for about 8 years. We usually had anywhere up to 100 people participating, with other parishioners coming as well as Family Group members. Every time we had a function the whole Parish was invited.

The Parish seemed to come alive socially as more people were able to put names to the familiar faces they had only seen as other parishioners/strangers. People started to congregate, talking to one another after Mass, instead of walking out the door and going straight home.

Unfortunately, as what has happened in our Parish churches in this day and age, attendance at Mass is not what it used to be. We only have two groups now. We did have four groups left but attendance was dropping because of people moving away or dying, so we merged them into two groups. Most of our Family Groups have aged, but we still enjoy each other's company. We don't have any children in our groups now, our children have all grown up, moved away, married and have children of their own. The spark is still there for a lot of them and they are practising what they learnt from their days in Family Groups and have groups of friends who get together with their children now.

We had a lovely celebration in our Parish at Jesus the Good Shepherd on Sunday 7th May, with Mass at 9:00am followed by morning tea in our Parish Hall. Fr Gerard our PP spoke very well about Family Groups at the beginning of Mass, during the Homily and at the end of Mass. We had approximately 60 people attend our Morning tea, (there were more at the Mass who didn't come over to the hall).

Diocese of Parramatta, New South Wales: developments

September was a busy month for the development of two new FAMILY GROUPS at **Our Lady of the Rosary Parish KELLYVILLE** in the north western hills area of Parramatta Diocese.

It is the second time, Family Groups have launched in the Parish. Two groups that formed about 38 years ago are still meeting monthly. One group Leader, Norma Evans, has given good support to new time Parish FG Coordinator, Phil Nickol. Two **new** groups have been formed with a good mix of ages and they are about to have their first outings.



As Parramatta Diocesan Promoters of Family Groups, we have visited Kellyville quite a few times over the past year speaking at Masses encouraging Parishioners to "give the Family Groups a go" and assisting with the launch of the groups in sign up Sunday. New Parish priest, Fr Chris Shorrock (OFM Conv) grew up in Dulwich Hill near St Brigid's Marrickville, the home of our Province Centre, so he is familiar with the Passionists and is supportive.

This Month, **Christ the King Parish, North Rocks** Parish Council will be meeting to discuss how to launch the Family Group concept in their Parish. Former PP, Fr Ian McGinnity, was deeply moved by the practical and emotional support offered by his sister's Family Group when her husband died suddenly some time ago. He initiated a discussion with the Parish Council this year and some older members of the Parish council fondly remembered the original Family Groups in the parish from the 1990's.

The parish of **St John's, Riverstone** is in one of the fastest growing localities in Sydney's west. The parish has been boosted recently with the acquisition of a disused Convent nearby and have committed to build a new Parish centre and larger CHURCH and has the vision to develop their community links too. Deacon Michael Tan will be the coordinator of Family Groups and he has developed a strong support team of parishioners who are meeting in January to further develop their plans to make sure all feel personally welcomed and engaged despite the large anticipated congregation.

Other Parramatta parishes expressing interest in FG development are St Bernadette's Lalor Park, and Good Shepherd Parish, Plumpton.

This gave those present a basis to assess the situation and functioning of the many Family Groups in their care. All believed that the Movement is greatly appreciated by the members and whilst the profile of members is predominately that of older people, this is a Movement that has served its membership very well and is continuing to do so.

We were excited to hear about renewed interest in the Movement in the Parramatta Diocese and affirmed our commitment to keep responding to support the PFGM membership.

Sadly this was the last time we were to gather with Margaret Casey. We have greatly benefitted from Marg's wisdom, friendship, vision, encouragement and the fun she brought to the team. May she now rest in the peace of her Lord.

BRIAN'S BLOG:

Mission or Maintenance?

Back in 1973, Michael Winter wrote a book with that title. The book invited reflection, for dioceses and parishes, about which of these options (Mission or Maintenance) was, or should be, their major priority.

It was a post Vatican 2 question because the focus within the Church had been radically altered by the Council from inward looking, to Pope John 23rd's call, "Let us open the windows and doors and let some fresh air come in." During his pontificate Pope Francis has called us to go further - to the (existential) peripheries, wherever people are marginalised and do not belong.

For a long time, the focus on maintenance continued as a priority in most parishes because different points of view about liturgy, theology, clerical and laity roles, etc. were more intent on 'getting it right', than remembering the purpose. Jesus' command was to, "Go out to the whole world and proclaim the good news". How many pastoral councils had that as a first item on their monthly agenda? Often an overfilled gutter or changing the altar servers' dress received greater focus.

It seems to me we need to address this same question to our Passionist Family Groups. Are we mostly focused inwardly, on maintenance, or are we focused on mission. If our conversations are only about 'Where will we gather for our next monthly get together?', or "We're getting too old to get together very often", then we are missing the gospel call and opportunity to reach out to and include others who are seeking belonging. It is wonderful if we have created strong bonds in our individual Family Groups but we have other aims — to build community in the parish and to live and love like the early Christians. It is true many of us are ageing, but that does not have to stop us from including others. If we always do what we've always done, we will always get what we have always got.

We are celebrating 50 years of the PFGM this year. I suggest we be brave enough to ask ourselves and others, whether we have become more focused on maintenance than mission. Having asked that question we might then ask how Jesus might speak to us, on the one hand reassuring us about the good we are doing but, on the other hand, challenging us about what more we could do.



Once a year, the Sunday Masses at St Joseph's are used to celebrate and give thanks for the PFGM within our part of the broader *Star of the Sea Parish*. This usually features slide shows of events, members addressing the congregation and refreshments after Mass.

As a way of raising the profile of the groups in the parish on a more regular basis, we instigated serving morning tea after Mass once a month. The morning teas have been well received and have assisted in recruiting some new members.

We have farewelled group co-leaders, Jill Murnane and Sr Maree Mansbridge, who are retiring after 31 years. They were members with a group of elderly ladies all of whom were no longer able to run a group. Individual members have all been warmly invited to join other groups.

The consensus of the group leaders was to not hold a major event to celebrate 50 years of PFGM as we had had our own major celebration the previous year. Each group decided to acknowledge the 50 years during one of their own outings. Our young assistant priest, who has brought a lot of energy to his role, believes that the PFGM may be able to fill a need in one or two of the congregations in our now expanded parish, Star of the Sea.

Margaret Ethel Casey (1944 - 7/8/2023)



Everyone is unique, but some people are more unique than others. Margaret, who died 7th August, fell into the latter category. She was always highly aware of the importance of community and education for the individual and society. She utilised her distinctive personality and endless energy to help develop community at the grass roots level through her longtime promotion of the Passionist Family Group

Movement in Wagga Wagga, the Riverina, and parts of Victoria. She also drew on her wide education and teaching skills to improve the lives of people of all ages, especially at the Wagga Wagga campus of TAFE.

Margaret was gifted with openness to life, confidence, warmth, optimism, a quick wit, and great energy. She was as colourful in her dress as she was in her disposition, people often stopping her in public places to remark on her uplifting appearance, in clothes that usually she had either made herself or bought from an op shop.

In 1985, Margaret, with the support of the late Maree McCausland and the late Fr Wilf Plunkett, was instrumental in introducing the Passionist Family Group Movement into Kooringal's Sacred Heart parish in Wagga Wagga. Margaret then assisted in establishing Family Groups throughout the Riverina, parts of Victoria, and more recently at Culburra Beach. With her idiosyncratic style, she was the ideal leader to implement its philosophy of 'Come as you are', of making the stranger welcome, and of demonstrating inclusiveness for all. Margaret's involvement in Family Groups was typical of her efforts to promote community through the many groups to which she belonged.

In 2017, Margaret was diagnosed with the rare neuroendocrine cancer. She moved into a world of hospitals, chemotherapy, radiation, clinical trials and numerous other treatments. She accepted her lot with grace and courage. She still continued her normal activities: Long walks on the beach with their dog, swimming in the ocean all year round, tai chi, yoga, and meditation, in addition to joining her children and grandchildren in the high-thrill activities of gigantic water slides at an adventure park and abseiling.

At Margaret's funeral at West Wollongong, attended by some 300 people, many from Wagga Wagga, her daughter Aletheia proposed in her eulogy for Margaret that words from Julia Baird's Phosphorescence were especially apt: 'Every now and then you actually do encounter someone who glows; someone who radiates goodness and seems to effortlessly inhabit a kind of joyThese people are simultaneously soothing and magnetic.' Such a person was Margaret Casey.

Maree Margaret Metcalfe 22/1/1946 -19/7/2023



Maree passed away suddenly at home on 19 July, and her funeral mass was held at Holy Cross Retreat, Templestowe, on 29 July 2023.

In 2019 Maree had written two half-pages on what she would like to happen when she died. Her three daughters found them after her death, and her wishes had a strong Passionist Family Group focus. First, she

wanted to be buried from the chapel at Holy Cross, her 'sacred place', a place she had known and loved for over 50 years.

She also wanted Tim Horlock, former director of PFGM in Victoria, as the funeral director and to have her friend and wedding celebrant, Brian Traynor CP, leading the liturgy. Unbeknown to her, she had a bonus which would have made her quite proud — the presence of Kathryn McKinlay, daughter of former key PFGM State Team members, Val and Terry Carrigg (Montmorency). Kathryn had recently been elected head of Speech Pathology Australia, a role Maree herself held nearly 50 years ago, at the start of her married life with Bernard.

And Maree wanted Family to be at the centre of her celebration, which it was, both the Metcalfe and Bick families, and the PFGM family which was so well represented. Other aspects of Maree's rich life were well represented too, especially her link to the Sion sisters who educated her at Box Hill from Prep, building on the faith handed on by her parents and inculcating in her a love of France and languages, as well as the sciences.

Maree was always a person of action, with a capital A, and came to leadership through service, whether it was in speech pathology, Nursing Mothers, school groups, parish pastoral support, working with asylum seekers, or in her PFGM roles for over 20 years.

May she now Rest in Peace.
