

\*In the Catholic Church, ordination to the diaconate is a sacred rite where a man is ordained as a deacon, a minister of the Church, through the laying on of hands by a bishop. Deacons are called to serve the Church through the ministry of the word, worship, pastoral care, and charity. They can be married or single and their formation often includes a rigorous program focusing on human, spiritual, intellectual, and pastoral dimensions.




### Hobart, TASMANIA -Wedding Bells

Luigi Tarisio was born in Italy in 1790. He made a living repairing furniture, and having developed a fascination with violins, he taught himself to play and then set about acquiring discarded violins. He sold good violins so as to purchase better ones. In 1827 he purchased a violin that had been made by Antonio Stradiveri in 1716. Antonio had always declared that this violin was not for sale. Tarisio boasted so much about this very special violin, that a famous French violinist of the time said, "Your violin is like the Messiah: He is always expected, but never appears.' That violin is now in the Ashmolean Museum in Oxford and it has hardly ever been played.

When Tarisio died he was clutching two violins and another 144 violins were crammed into cupboards and drawers. Among these violins was the famous 'Messiah'. It was virtually never seen or heard, despite its purpose having been to make beautiful music. By hiding it away from everyone and not playing it himself, Tarisio denied people the opportunity of hearing this beautiful instrument being played.

When you consider that each of us is a unique instrument, it is worth asking whether we hide the best ourselves that could be shared. In terms of Passionist Family Groups, have we become reclusive and although expected, never appear at monthly activities?

With winter upon us, 'not appearing' can be genuine 'excuse' because of the cold weather, but fancy being found one day alone and friendless, despite having had the personal capacity to reach out to others, to give and receive love and fellowship. That would be much worse that Tarisio's hiding his violins away.

Let us resolve to be seen and be heard!

### Vale: Paul Henry Darbyshire of New Zealand: 27 November 1959 – 15 March 2025

Many of you may have heard the sad news of Paul's death on Saturday morning, March 15 2025. Linda, his wife, was by his side when he quietly slipped away. Paul passed away in New Plymouth at the age of 65, after a long battle with cancer. Paul was accepting of his diagnosis and calm in the face of death.

Paul interviewed me for the First City Wide Youth Minister position in Palmerston North. Who would have thought our lives would be entwined through the PFGM? This is where I met his wife, Linda, and started an association through Passionist Family Groups. Paul had a great passion for supporting and working with young people. He and Linda were involved in this ministry for 16 years and opened doors and hearts to many young people including hospitality, acceptance and enduring friendship.



Paul and Linda, along with John and Mary Ellen Leen, served as PFGM National Coordinators in New Zealand for five years and they all continued to be a support and encouragement in my role as National Coordinator from July 2021. This is a sad time as we remember a man who had a good heart, a great sense of humour and a habit of stirring along with his generosity and care for others. He is missed and I ask that you keep Linda and family, along with Paul's family and friends, in your prayer. Paul's funeral was celebrated at St Joseph's, New Plymouth.

With love and in friendship - our family journey continues but we shall not forget our brother, Paul.

Paul's coffin bore three images of the PFG logo – his connection to youth, young adults and Passionist Family Groups. Paul was always ready to serve, assist, build up and, of course, 'have you on'. He was a good stirrer. We remember his wife Linda and their family and friends. The simplicity of Paul's funeral typified the practical faith that Paul and Linda shared. May he rest in peace.
