### A NURTURING STAGE

At the national meeting of the PFGM in August ,there were presentations and discussions around the theme of 'nurturing' our Family Groups, whereas such a meeting in the 1990's would have been discussing how we could deal with expansion.

We agreed that there is some growing, but essentially, we are in a phase where the emphasis is on nurturing our relationships and attending to the flexible structures we have.

There are a number of factors that have led to the ageing of our Groups. The first, is that this reflects church attendance. Those that do join a Family Group are older rather than younger and they fill the gaps for those who have moved to a new area or to the greatly desired residence of heaven! There are a lot of Catholic students in our schools, but few are Mass goers. The younger families that do attend church, tend to be from cultures who have much to offer but most are not attracted to mix with parishioners from other cultures.

The role of the parish priest is critical in supporting the Movement. Where there is a vibrant community, the atmosphere is warm and outreaching. One of our aims is to create and sustain the parish community. The gospel calls for this, but some priests and even many young adults, seem to focus on individual faith and aspects of parish life rather than on building and sustaining relationships.

We agreed at the national gathering that we want to be connected by kindness. We want to encourage those who are involved, to keep nurturing their relationships by maintaining connections. With many members now in senior years there is a tendency to withdraw; to not go out as much, especially at night, and this leads to isolation and loneliness. A quick visit, a phone call or a note are simple ways of nurturing relationships among the older members.

We have always tried to encourage members to focus on the members of their Passionist Family Group, not the functions. The 'monthly' gatherings keep people connected and celebrate relationships. In that way, they highlight the relationships rather than the other way around. Some functions can be very enjoyable, but they may exclude some members because of cost, or not allow healthy interactions.

Maybe your group can discuss how you can best nurture your relationships and contribute that gift to the parish community.
